A NOTE TO THE READER

This report reflects the findings of Canadian media coverage associated with the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Coronavirus case and media trends which are the foundation of this analysis portend earned media opportunities in the days following the flattening of infection and mortality rates. Just as these rates change from one country to the next, so do the pace and extent of earned media opportunities. We do not assert our expertise in predicting the infections curves, but rather, suggest only conditionally that if the infection and media patterns in Canada reflect trends in other countries, we can expect certain pathways to emerge across all countries. As such, please consider these findings "directional" rather than "statistically significant".

Please keep in mind that both Coronavirus and media trends are shown at the national and provincial level, rather than local level. While certain locales may see infections and coverage continue to surge, other parts of the country may experience a flatter curve more quickly. As such, deceleration in one area within a country may offset local surges in another. Unless otherwise indicated, the data reflects Canadian coverage in aggregate.

REPORT PARAMETERS

This report is a summary of Canadian earned news media content only, published between May 17 and May 23, focused on discussions related to COVID-19 and Coronavirus. The analysis is based on English and French media content.

MEDIA SCOPE

This analysis features earned media coverage from over 50,000 unique media outlets across both traditional and digital media sources, including:

WEEKLY CANADIAN COVID-19 MEDIA TRENDS

National

- On May 22, Justin Trudeau disclosed that the federal government is looking into several contact-tracing apps with intention to "recommend strongly to Canadians a particular app that will help us manage the spread of COVID-19."
- Dr. Theresa Tam, Canada's Chief Public Health Officer, officially recommended Canadians wear non-medical face masks in situations where maintaining a two-meter distance from others is not feasible.
- Epidemiologists and clinicians are bracing for second wave of Coronavirus cases, with some models showing a resurgence in cases by September. Dr. Sandy Buchman, President of the Canadian Medical Association (CMA) stated "We need the contact tracing and serological testing in order to make decisions about what to do next ... We're scrambling. In my opinion, we're not fully prepared for a second wave."

Western Canada

- On May 20, Alberta indefinitely suspended a "wide array of environmental monitoring requirements" for its
 entire energy industry. The Alberta Energy Regulator justified the decision as a means to ensure
 compliance with COVID-19 orders and guidelines. The move was widely criticized by indigenous groups
 and environmental advocates.
- The Vancouver Police Department reported an eightfold increase in hate-crime investigations compared to 2019. The VPD associated the rise in anti-Asian hate crimes, including physical and verbal attacks and vandalism of prominent landmarks, with COVID-19 and its Chinese origins.

Ontario

- On May 19, Ontario Premier Doug Ford announced that the province would be cancelling in-person primary and secondary classes for Ontario's 2 million students for the remainder of the school year. Overnight summer camps throughout the province have also been ordered closed.
- Ontario has consistently failed to meet its own COVID-19 testing goals. As of May 21, Ontario was 6,000 tests short of its goal of 16,000 tests per day, with only 5,813 tests conducted on Victoria Day.
- Merrilee Fullerton, Ontario Minister of Long-term Care, announced an independent commission into long-term care homes to examine Coronavirus' impact on the nursing home sector. Critics of the decision claimed that there should be a full-scale public inquiry.

Quebec

- Quebec announced that it would be allowing groups of up to 10 people from a maximum of three households to gather outside, effective May 22.
- Quebec announced that it would be permitting day camps to reopen, with campers grouped into 'bubbles'
 as a proposed means to reduce the spread of COVID-19. Children attending camps would not be required to
 wear masks.

Eastern Canada

- On May 22, Nova Scotia's Chief Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Robert Strang, discouraged Nova Scotians
 from wearing gloves as a prevention method, stating "Gloves give people a false sense of security and
 they're much less likely to wash their hands."
- Starting May 29, temporary foreign workers will be allowed back into New Brunswick after quarantining for 14 days. The decision was met with praise from some farming and fishing organizations, while others criticized it, saying the announcement came too late.

Territories

• Low-income essential workers in Yukon received a temporary \$4 per hour wage increase.














BY TOTAL VOLUME OF WEEKLY CANADIAN COVID-19 COVERAGE
