

COVID-19 IN CANADIAN MEDIA

A WEEKLY MEDIA SUMMARY FOR PROFESSIONAL COMMUNICATORS

For the week of MAY 31 – JUNE 6, 2020

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A NOTE TO THE READER

This report reflects the findings of Canadian media coverage associated with the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Coronavirus case and media trends which are the foundation of this analysis portend earned media opportunities in the days following the flattening of infection and mortality rates. Just as these rates change from one country to the next, so do the pace and extent of earned media opportunities. We do not assert our expertise in predicting the infections curves, but rather, suggest only conditionally that if the infection and media patterns in Canada reflect trends in other countries, we can expect certain pathways to emerge across all countries. As such, please consider these findings "directional" rather than "statistically significant".

Please keep in mind that both Coronavirus and media trends are shown at the national and provincial level, rather than local level. While certain locales may see infections and coverage continue to surge, other parts of the country may experience a flatter curve more quickly. As such, deceleration in one area within a country may offset local surges in another. Unless otherwise indicated, the data reflects Canadian coverage in aggregate.

REPORT PARAMETERS

This report is a summary of Canadian earned news media content only, published between May 31 and June 6, focused on discussions related to COVID-19 and Coronavirus. The analysis is based on English and French media content.

MEDIA SCOPE

This analysis features earned media coverage from over 50,000 unique media outlets across both traditional and digital media sources, including:

- Traditional Television
- Traditional Radio
- Traditional Print
- Online / Web-based News



WEEKLY CANADIAN COVID-19 MEDIA TRENDS

National

- On June 5, Prime Minister Trudeau offered provinces and territories up to \$14 billion if they coordinate their reopening efforts with the federal government. The funding would help cover 10 paid sick days for workers, PPE for frontline workers, child care, and municipal services.
- Canada's Chief Public Health Officer, Dr. Theresa Tam, warned of an "explosive growth" in new cases if provincial reopening efforts do not exercise sufficient caution.
- On June 5, the federal government announced that it would be sending a one-time, tax-free payment of up to \$600 to Canadians with disabilities. The payment size is dependent on recipients having a valid Disability Tax Credit certificate, eligibility for Old Age Security (OAS), and eligibility for the Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS).

Western Canada

- On June 1, British Columbia schools reopened on a part-time, voluntary basis. Provincial Health Officer, Dr. Bonnie Henry, said the province is taking the necessary precautions to keep students and teachers safe.
- Manitoba Premier, Brian Pallister, announced that the province would be providing an additional, one-time \$1,000 (labelled as 'Hero Pay') to frontline workers. The incentive will be given to frontline workers as long as they meet certain conditions (earn \$2,500 or less per month, \$6,250 or less over the past 2.5 months, etc.).

Ontario

- Due to a lack of communication between William Osler Health System hospitals and Mount Sinai Hospital's laboratory, roughly 700 confirmed COVID-19 cases in Toronto that were not flagged to public health officials.
- On June 4, Liberal MP and former Minister of Health and Minister of Indigenous Services, Jane Philpott, was appointed as Ontario's special adviser to its new Ontario Health Data Platform. Among other things, the platform is intended to help researchers and healthcare professionals detect, plan, and respond to COVID-19 issues.
- Ontario Premiere, Doug Ford, stated on June 5 that the province would be exploring the possibility of moving into Stage 2 of reopening within a few weeks. The loosened restrictions would include more business reopenings and larger social gathering groups, among other changes.

Quebec

- Quebec Premiere, Francois Legault stated the province has received 69,000+ applications from people looking to work in long-term care institutions. Immigration advocates characterized Legault's hiring practices as discriminatory, as the 10,000 orderly positions the province is looking to fill requires applicants to be Canadian citizens and residents of Quebec.
- Quebec announced \$250M in cultural funding, in an effort to encourage artists and creatives to start creating content again. Film and TV production are slated to resume June 8.

Eastern Canada

- On June 5, Nova Scotia opened bars, restaurants, private campgrounds, and some healthcare providers
 opened with some restrictions. June 5 also marked the fifth consecutive day with no new cases for the
 province.
- Newfoundland and Labrador announced that starting June 8, groups of up to 20 would be permitted as long as they followed social distancing rules.

Territories

• Discussions regarding a 'Northern Bubble' among Canada's northern territories have been dropped due to Yukon opening it's border with British Columbia.





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


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CANADIAN COVERAGE TOPICS BY VOLUME





BY TOTAL VOLUME OF WEEKLY CANADIAN COVID-19 COVERAGE




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BY PERCENTAGE OF WEEKLY CANADIAN COVID-19 COVERAGE

DR. THERESA TAM – CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICER
